

Holy Tender Loving Care



Dear Sisters and Brothers,

As summer comes into full swing, we journey through the Gospels together and in the weeks after Pentecost think about what life as a Christian means for us, much as the disciples did in the weeks and month after Jesus ascended into Heaven and they received the gift of the Holy Spirit. Like they, we joyfully declare that Jesus has made everything new! And yet we struggle with our day-to-day activities, sometimes wondering, how do we go about our lives in a Christian way? Is there anything different about the way that I live because of Jesus? Is there anything in the way I act that makes people stop and think that whatever I do is for God's glory and not for myself? With Independence Day approaching, it gives a good opportunity to reflect on how it is that a Christian—

someone who knows that she is freed from sin, death, and the devil—lives out their freedom. And how that is different than the way many around us understand freedom.

We often hear about freedom of speech, and freedom of the press. People talk about free markets and free trade, as in efforts to de-regulate businesses, for example. There's also freedom of religion, of course, as in the right to practice one's faith without the state interfering. It all quickly becomes very complicated with lots of strong feelings and opinions on one side or the other. One person's exercise of freedom may seem to infringe on the freedoms of others. We often hear the phrase, "It's a free country," which usually means that "I can do anything I please." That's how people most-often think of freedom: as self-governance, being able to decide for yourself what is best for you and not having anyone infringe on your autonomy as long as you're not hurting anybody else.

That type of freedom is fine and dandy in terms of civic life. In fact, that's why government exists: to maintain order and to punish evildoers. Beyond that, it's very much up for debate how much role the government should play in our lives, with some wanting more involvement, and some wanting as little as possible. But what if the tyranny and the chains that you need to be freed from aren't of some oppressive power. What if they're inside your heart? Luther describes the way most people think of freedom like an addict being free to feed an addiction. "We do whatever we want! That is our bondage!"

This is where Christianity offers something more than a civic understanding of freedom does. God desires the physical liberty and well-being of every creature. In fact, in Scripture, God reveals Himself again and again as precisely the God of liberated slaves! But it is not enough for God that we should be free from physical bonds just to be enslaved to sin, to self, and to devil's empty promises. In Jesus we see that God is intent on freeing us from so much more. In Him we have a clean conscience before God and are able to be perfectly content with all we have. We don't need to chase after fame or fortune or worry about making a name for ourselves or impressing others. We don't have to worry about impressing God or buying our way out of Hell.

Luther's treatise "The Freedom of a Christian" is a commentary on a paradox. He writes, "A Christian person is a free sovereign, above all things, subject to no one; A Christian is a dutiful servant in all things, subject to everyone." That is to say, because we are saved and made right with God by grace, we do not need to be anxious, striving in life when it comes to trying to work out our salvation. Our salvation is completely ours and we don't have to prove ourselves to the devil or any person to claim it. Of course, Luther does not stop with the first statement in his paradox – though many in our society might wish he did. No, Luther continues, "A Christian is a dutiful servant in all things, subject to everyone." That is to say, because we are free from the rat-race of life, from impressing by making a name for ourselves or lording over others, we are *freed-up* to devote all our attention to God's service and our neighbor's well-being.

While civil freedom is freedom *from* something, Christian freedom is freedom *for* something. When countries and peoples celebrate their independence days, they celebrate freedom *from* other people. We, the baptized, are freed *for* other people.

Because we are saved by God's grace, we are free to love the neighbor without any strings attached. The Christian way of living short-circuits self-centered living. It short-circuits this perpetual

adolescence we're so used to, where we're always trying to be independent and assert ourselves and justify our views. Our horizons open up for us to embrace and love our neighbors, just because God loves them and that's good enough a reason for me to love them too, undistracted the mindless pursuit of stuff or pathological need to be right.

For the early Church, this new way of living meant leaving everything behind or sharing everything in common. For many throughout history, they've accepted to challenge to live simple lives of service too. But whether we have much or little, whether we have a lot of leisure time or have to work all the time, as Christians we are able to not be preoccupied with a shallow freedom that's just autonomy, but are freed to use our lives to love and live the way Jesus does.
